Update from the Supervisor's Office

As we emerge from a harsh winter, I wanted to recognize and commend our Town Highway Department. Their dedication and hard work in keeping our streets clear and safe, despite the regional salt shortage, has not gone unnoticed. Many of you have shared your appreciation and I wholeheartedly echo your sentiments. Their efforts ensure that our community remains accessible and safe during these winter months.

Looking ahead to warmer days, I am excited to share updates on the reestablishment of the Town's Summer Recreation Program. This transition from a Newfane Central School District program to one fully managed by the Town has been a priority for the last few months. The Town is greatly appreciative of Superintendent James Lupini and his staff for filling in the gap the last 2 years. I'm pleased to announce that we will retain the same experienced leadership—Mr. Capen and Mrs. Sheldon—as well as any returning counselors and lifeguards for the 2025 season. After listening to residents and participants the Town Board has approved a five-day-per-week, five-week program, running from July 7th through August 8th, from 9 AM to 3 PM. Progress continues toward the development of Harper's Dog Park here in Newfane. I am happy to report that we have secured a grant from the Grigg Lewis Foundation to help offset the cost of fencing. 

Happy Spring! The snow is melting and sun is beginning to shine. I hope this newsletter finds that everyone is doing well and fared the winter as best possible. After a few mild winters, it made a more typical WNY winter feel extra-long and unrelenting. I am proud of the local and county response to the storms and how our communities rallied together to support our neighbors and loved ones.

We truly have the best first responders of any county and they appreciate our support. Cleanup begins now in order to have our community ready for summer, and I'm sure everyone is anxious for more warmth and sunshine.

Krull Park:

Our park continues to be a big topic in my newsletter updates because there continues to be a lot going on at the park and long-term investments being made every year. As previously reported, in 2025 Krull Park will see a new playground to replace the aging structure at the entrance of the park. New pickleball courts will be built next to the existing but rehabilitated tennis courts. Extensive tree maintenance is necessary. This is a tough subject due to the beautiful big old trees in the park but safety is top priority so we will work with arborists to determine the best options. A bird nesting pole was installed to hopefully help create a nesting location for our resident bald eagles or other large birds. Parks is currently hiring summer help so please let anyone know looking for fun summer work to apply online.

Infrastructure:

Road and bridge maintenance will be extensive this year. A rough winter with more plowing and freeze/thaw saw our roads crumble and every municipality will be dealing with the effects. The North end of Hess Rd has been a focus in order to increase creek flow and prevent flooding from the watershed. This also helps our farmers with field drainage and to ensure the water continues to move downstream. An obvious hot topic is construction on Burt Rd Bridge over 18 Mile Creek. I understand and appreciate the community's patience during this construction project. I know it is frustrating but it is also necessary for longevity of the bridge. Almost 10 years ago, the bridge deck was rebuilt with new steel and widened for a sidewalk. This current project is to actually rehabilitate the concrete piers in the water. Cofferdams will be installed in order to access the entire pier and repair the aged concrete and rebar. I will provide any updates to the project and feel free to contact me with any concerns.

I would like to conclude this newsletter with a humble request for service. Our community is truly blessed with many amazing organizations who strive to improve the quality of life of our residents and also those who visit our region. Whether it is a volunteer firehall, lions club, church group, carousel park, business group, school student groups or even just offer help at one specific event such as polar bear, pirates fest, car shows, bike night, community days, Blossom/harvest fest, jazz trail, Ye Olde Log Cabin. I could go on and on but my request is a call to action for these events and organizations. Attend their fun and festive events, get to know our community volunteers, and hopefully at some point you may feel inspired to assist in the future.



Assemblyman Paul Bologna

144th Assembly District

As a representative for our community, my goal is to assure that our local leaders have the tools and support they need to help our region thrive. That includes leaders in local government, first responders and businesses.

One of the first packages of legislation that I introduced in the State Assembly was aimed at alleviating some of the pressures that our volunteer fire companies are feeling when it comes to recruitment and retention of members.

The over 100,000 volunteer firefighters and emergency service teams across New York State save taxpayers more than \$3 billion annually. The savings are realized not only because the volunteers aren't paid wages but because fundraising by volunteer departments reduces the need to levy taxes for equipment and operations. For context, if all of New York's volunteer firefighters became paid firefighters, property tax rates would increase by an average of 26 percent in municipalities to provide that payment—with some seeing an increase of more than 120 percent.

With that, over the past 20 years, New York state has seen a significant decrease in the ranks of volunteer firefighters by approximately 40,000 individuals. It has become increasingly challenging to recruit new firefighters and retain existing ones due to factors such as the turbulent economy and busy schedules.

That is why I am taking steps to help not only incentivize new recruits, but also keep up retention of current volunteers to ensure our community's safety.

The first bill I have sponsored is, A.4414, would allow volunteer firefighters to attend training without being penalized by their employer. Training for volunteers is rigorous and often cumbersome when balancing work & family, so this legislation would provide an opportunity to meet training criteria without fear of losing your job. To offset this accommodation made by employers, this legislation also creates tax incentives for employing volunteer firefighters.

I have also introduced A.4720, which would create the Volunteer Emergency Services Reimbursement Tax Credit. This would allow for volunteer firefighters or volunteer ambulance workers to receive a credit for mileage when using their personal vehicles to respond to emergencies. Volunteering to help the community and save lives should never come at a personal cost, and this legislation aims to offset out of pocket mileage expenses to emergency service volunteers.

Lastly, A.4667 would create the New York State Local Emergency Services Account. This would take funds, that the State is already collecting, from the cell phone surcharge fee, and create a designated account specifically for local emergency services to use for communication equipment, vehicles, and PPE. This package of legislation is imperative in supporting our first responders. As a State, we need to start looking more closely at the money that is already being collected and make sure that we are maximizing the use of those dollars and investing in our critical infrastructure and services.

I strongly encourage you to consider joining a local volunteer fire company as it is truly a rewarding community service experience. Newfane Newsletter Spring 2025

At the time of this writing, the governor and legislators continue negotiating the New York State budget, one of the largest in the nation at a proposed \$252 billion. Of course there are some lawmakers who want more, but my conference would like to see that figure drop dramatically.

One thing governor Hochul and many lawmakers agree on is that New York has become a very expensive state to live and operate a business in - but we disagree on ways to address it. My colleagues in the majority fail to understand that we cannot spend our way to affordability. If spending more money was the answer, New York would be the most affordable state in the nation. Our current budget is larger than those of Florida and Texas combined – yet, each state individually has more residents than New York.

My conference has advocated for reducing taxes on businesses and residents. We have called for cutting red tape, regulations, and mandates that make running a business more challenging. We oppose climate taxes on consumers and want to create lasting, affordable and reliable energy for New York.

The governor and the majority have unrealistic aspirations for our state in advocating for the Climate Leadership and Community Protection Act - and attempting to force the goals of this climate council on New Yorkers has proved disastrous. Our infrastructure is simply not ready for the increased demand of an all-electric society, and our energy providers have been forced to pass the cost of upgrading their systems onto you, the consumer. Niagara County is home to the cleanest energy provider in the state with the Niagara Power Project - a hydroelectric facility operated by the New York Power Authority. The clean, reliable power being generated here should not only be distributed locally at a reduced rate, but also used to benefit Western New York manufacturers and businesses. NYPA makes plenty of money off ratepayers throughout New York and neighboring states, yet just a couple of months ago, they wanted to triple the preferred rates to local business, municipalities, nonprofits and school districts. NYPA said this was to offset costs of planned infrastructure upgrades.

I heard from countless business owners, local officials and constituents about how detrimental the rate increases would have been. Manufacturers told me they would simply have to shut down operations in New York and either shutter their business or move to a more affordable location. Thankfully, following a letter sent by my office and signed by members of the Western New York legislative delegation, the governor thankfully paused their plans to raise rates.

My conference will continue calling for a stop to raising utility rates, and a pause to unfunded mandates from the CLCPA so utility services have more time to adapt.

Another issue that I along with my conference members were heavily attentive to were the strikes at state prisons across New York. I visited these corrections officers on the line and was proud to stand and meet with corrections officers and their families in Albany. All these brave officers are asking for are safer working conditions and to be able to spend more time with their families.

Today, our prisons are more violent than ever. Data shows that there has been vast increases of inmate on inmate attacks and inmate on corrections officers attacks over the last few years. And quite simply it's because

An Update from Niagara County Sheriff Michael J. Filicetti



The Niagara County Sheriff's Office continuously strives to improve their capabilities to best serve the residents of Niagara County. I would like to take a minute to talk about some of the notable events over the past year. The Niagara County Law Enforcement Academy building, located on the SUNY Niagara Campus, opened its doors for the first time. Now, agencies across Western New York will be able to utilize this state of the art building which includes several classroom spaces, the Virtra Use of Force training simulator, a defensive tactics mat room area, and a modular structure for tactical training operations. This will ensure improved training to future deputies and officers throughout the area.

The Niagara County Sheriff's Office welcomed K9 Shongo this past year. Shongo was a 13-month old German shepherd from Hungary when he joined the Sheriff's Office, acquired through Shallow Creek Kennels - Premier Police Service Dogs. Shongo was partnered with Deputy Corey Hohl. Deputy Hohl and K9 Shongo completed Patrol and Tracking School in June. With the completion of this 14-week school Deputy Hohl and his partner are now certified in tracking, building searches, and criminal apprehension.

With the increase in traffic complaints, the Niagara County Sheriff's Office recently designated Deputy Nicholas Ross as a full-time traffic car to address these complaints. Deputy Ross has always been committed to ensure the roadways of Niagara County are safe, receiving his second STOP-DWI MADD Award this past year. Deputy Ross has been training with the DOT for Commercial Vehicle Inspections to address public concerns regarding commercial motor vehicle enforcement.

The Niagara County Sheriff's Office welcomed Dr. Christian Westring, Ph.D., as Director of the Sheriff's Office Forensic Laboratory, as well. Director Westring holds a Ph.D. in Biology and has an extensive background in Forensics. Prior to joining NCSO, Director Westring was the Director and Professor of Practice at Purdue University Northwest Center for Crime and Forensics.

The Niagara County Sheriff's Office Jail has been accredited since 2001 and obtained their reaccreditation in April, which will be valid through 2029. The Niagara County Correctional Facility was also honored to be the recipient of the New York State Sheriff's Institute Innovative Program Award. The Innovative Program Award recognizes a sheriff's office for developing and implementing an outstanding specialized program that benefits their community and has potential to be implemented by sheriffs across the state.

Looking back at just some of the positives from 2024, we are looking forward to continuing to provide the best service possible and are excited to see what this year has in store. As spring approaches we are already preparing for the Easter Egg Hunt. The Niagara County Sheriff's Office Easter Egg Hunt is scheduled for Saturday April 12th, 2025 from 1PM-3PM. It will be hosted at SUNY Niagara (in front of NCLEA, 3101 Saunders Settlement Rd), Lot 4. There will be areas designated for children of various ages. Please come and join the fun!

Purple Route - Lewiston/Porter/Wilson/Cambria


Red Route - North Tonawanda/Wheatfield/Niagara/Niagara Falls/Lewiston

The best thing – if you are within three quarters of a mile of the bus route, and you can call the day before, the bus will come to you for pick up and drop off.



Bring the previous Rabies Vaccination Certificate for cats and dogs. WITHOUT proof of previous vaccination, you will receive a certificate valid for one year. Dogs and Cats WITH proof will receive a certificate valid for three years. All Ferrets must receive vaccinations annually.

<u>ALL ANIMALS</u> must be properly restrained. Cats & Ferrets must be in a carrier. Dogs must be leashed.

RABIES EXPIRATION: When your Dog License Renewal comes due, please check the expiration date of the Rabies Vaccinations. That information is located toward the top right of the License Renewal. If that expiration date falls within 30 days of the date to renew your license, we will need an updated Rabies Certificate to renew the License. If the information is blank that means it has expired and we will need an updated Rabies Certificate. Do not bring your Invoice as this does not contain all the information needed to process your License. If your pet was ill and not able to receive the Rabies Vaccination you must bring a letter from your veterinarian stating so. This will be necessary every year that you renew if your pet has not been vaccinated. This is a New York State requirement.

ATTENTION DOG OWNERS!!

The Town of Newfane will be continuing the mail-in dog enumeration (census) as required by Article 7 of the New York State Agriculture and Markets Law, any dog 4 months of age or older must be licensed in the Local Town where they are sheltered. Please fill out the form below and return it with the appropriate information:

- 2. Spayed or neutered certificate from Veterinarian

*LIFETIME LICENSE HOLDERS: Your license privilege tags are sent directly to the last address on file with the DEC Fulfillment Center. If you have moved it is imperative that you inform the DEC of your new address. If you have Hunter Education or Bowhunting Education that needs to be added to your account you may edit your profile on-line, bring your original to a DEC License Sales Agent or fax it to (518-402-9025). Once the information is in your file the appropriate license or tags can be sent to you from the Fulfillment Center. Do not wait until the beginning of the season to take care of this as it will take approximately ten to fourteen days to receive your tags.

Cooking With the Clerks

HOT COCOA SOUFFLE

5 Large Eggs
4 teaspoons plus ¾ cups sugar, divided
½ cup baking cocoa
6 tablespoons all-purpose flour
¼ teaspoon salt
1-1/2 cups fat free milk
2 tablespoons butter
1-1/2 teaspoons vanilla extract
Confectioners' sugar optional



- 1. Separate eggs: let stand at room temperature for 30 minutes. Coat a 2-qt souffle dish with cooking spray and lightly sprinkle with 4 tsp. sugar. set aside.
- 2. In a saucepan, combine the cocoa, flour, salt and remaining sugar. Gradually whisk in milk. Bring to a boil, stirring constantly. Cook and stir 1-2 minutes longer or until thickened. Stir in butter. Transfer to a large bowl.
- 3. Stir in a small amount of hot mixture into egg yolks: return all to the bowl, stirring constantly. Add vanilla: cool slightly
- 4. In a large bowl, with clean beaters, beat egg white until stiff peaks form. With a spatula, stir in a fourth of the egg whites into chocolate mixture until no white streaks remain. Fold in remaining egg whites until combined.
- 5. Transfer prepared dish. Bake 350° for 40-45 minutes or until the top is puffed and center appears set. If desired, dust with confectioners' sugar. Serve immediately.

SWEET BABY RAY'S CROCKPOT CHICKEN

4 to 5 chicken breasts
1 bottle Sweet Baby Ray's sauce
1/4 cup vinegar
1 teaspoon red pepper flakes
1 teaspoon garlic powder

Mix everything but the chicken together Place chicken in crockpot. Pour sauce mixture over the chicken.

Cook on LOW 4 to 6 hours.

August 1st of each year, we remove all unpaid balances to the following year's County tax bill. A tax removal fee of %10 is added to your bill as well as a \$100.00 administrative fee.

Garbage Reminders

Please have your garbage and/or recycling out curbside by 6 a.m. on your garbage day to ensure they pick it up. Please place your garbage and recycling totes with the handles facing towards the house and keep them a minimum of 2 feet away from mailboxes or other totes, which will give room for the arms of the truck to properly pick up your tote to empty it.

Large item pick-up is the third full week of collection each month on your garbage day. Please adhere to three large items on your garbage day during bulk pick-up week.

Should you require another garbage tote, please contact the Water Department at 716-778-8132 Ext. 6 to purchase and one will be delivered. We have large garbage totes available for \$80.00 and small totes available for \$50.00. Please be advised an additional annual fee of \$55 applies to any additional tote. Bag tags are available for \$5.00 a piece at the Water Office at the Newfane Town Hall. A maximum of 5 bag tags are allowed per week.

Water Service Material and Size Inspection Reminder

The Town of Newfane Water Office is required by New York state to perform and record inspections on all homes in the Town of Newfane for the water service line material and size from the public side, as well as the homeowner's side. These inspections are to ensure that there are no lead water service lines in the Town of Newfane and are to be completed by October of 2024. Please be advised that the Newfane Water Office will be calling residents to schedule the inspection or to let them know when the inspections will be taking place on their street and to make sure they will be home. If there are any questions regarding these inspections, please call the Water Office at 716-778-8132 Ext. 6.

Starting a New Business?

If you're planning to open a new business, please reach out to the Building Inspector with your plans. An inspection of your premises is required to ensure all building codes and zoning ordinances have been followed and completed.

- Serving Food or Alcohol? Make sure to contact the appropriate authorities, such as the Niagara County Board of Health or the State Liquor Authority, for the necessary approvals.
- **Certificate of Occupancy (COO)**: Your business can officially open once you receive your COO.

Outstanding Building Permits

If you have an open Building Permit, please contact the Building Inspector/Code Enforcement Officer to schedule the necessary inspections throughout your project. This ensures the Town can properly close out your permit upon completion.

Short-Term Rentals (STR)

A reminder that all Short-Term Rentals are required to obtain a Special Exception Permit, which must be renewed annually.

Updated Fee Schedule

Effective January 1, 2025, the Town Board approved updates to the fee schedule for permits and inspections. You can review the new fee schedule on the town's website: www.townofnewfane.com.

Code Updates on the Horizon



ASSESSOR'S OFFICE

The world's favorite season is Spring. All things seem possible in the Spring.

While we are finishing up the income tax season, remember it is not too early to renew your Senior Low-Income Exemption and or your Low-Income Disability Exemptions for 2026! So, before you file away your 2024 1099 statements or your 2024 1040 Federal Income Tax returns, bring a copy down to the Assessor's office and we can securely keep them on file for the 2026 renewal. The deadline for the 2026 renewals is not until March 1st 2026, but who wants to drive out in the snow next winter! Any applications for an exemption received after March 1, 2025 will be applied to the 2026 tax year.

A home is one of the most important and largest investments people will make. Just like the ups and downs of the stock market, the value of our homes can vary based on current market conditions and the condition of your property. If you feel that your current assessment is too low or too high, you may register a formal complaint to the Assessor and grieve your assessment before the Board of Assessment Review (BAR) via the officially prescribed RP-524 form available at the Assessor's Office at Town Hall or online at www.tax.ny.gov. You must file your complaint prior to May 1, 2025. The Board of Assessment Review will hold a grievance day on Thursday May 29th 2025, again, you must file your complaint by May 1, 2026 for your assessment to be reviewed. The Town of Newfane BAR is an independent Board whose membership contains a variety of local residences who are charged with reviewing and adjudicating all complaints received on real property assessment; further the BAR has the authority to overrule the Assessor. Be sure to bring a cogent justification of your reasoning and be able to identify a number of comparable properties to your assessment. thank you.

Also... It's Photo Time!!



Roadside Brush Pickup -What to Do and Not Do

The following rules will be enforced for the town wide brush pick-up:

- All branches MUST be piled as neatly as possible with ALL CUT ENDS FACING the road and NO LONGER then 10 ft long.
- Tree removal companies are responsible to remove ALL of their own debris.
- We will NOT pick up large stumps, leaves, rubbish, etc.
- A maximum amount of 2 tandem truck loads will be picked up at a time at any one residence.
- We will NOT pick up branches in front of wooded lots that are being cleared.
- We will NOT be responsible for any damages to anything that is under the pile of brush that we cannot see. Large piles are picked up with large machinery.





Olcott Beach Carousel Park (OBCP) is opening May 24, 25, & 26, from 12 - 6 pm. That means that there is a lot of preparation to be done before we can be ready for our 23rd season! If you are available, we are always looking for volunteers to help get the park set up for the season. That will happen on Saturday, **May 10, starting at 9 a.m.** Generally, this involves cleaning, raking leaves, sweeping, and moving equipment from storage. Please feel free to come to the front or back gate and we will put you to work!

We are also looking for volunteers to help run the carousel, work at the Pick-Up-A-Duck and Skee Ball games, and sell ride tickets in the ticket booth. Two three-hour shifts (12 - 3 & 3 - 6 pm) are available each day the park is open (holidays and weekends). Volunteers can choose which days, shifts and areas they would like to work We train

our volunteers on **Saturday, May 17th, from 10 am - 12 pm,** so if you haven't had a chance to signup, just show up! However, if someone wants to volunteer and can't come that day, we can make special arrangements to train them when they come to volunteer. There is a sign-up sheet in the carousel building for available shifts and jobs. Volunteers can sign up during our hours of operation or email. If this sounds like something you would be interested in doing or would like more information, please email Rosemary Sansone at: *rsansone1947@gmail.com.*

In addition to our volunteers, the park also employs high school and college students aged 16 or older to run the kiddie rides (Ferris wheel, rocket swings, boats, cars, and sky fighter). Training is also provided and they are paid \$17.00 per hour. High school students may get an application form from their guidance department or by emailing or phoning Dr. Rosemary Sansone at rsansone1947@gmail.com or 716-778-7066.

For those of you who do not know, OBCP is a not-for-profit vintage kiddie amusement park run by volunteers. Adults and children can take a spin on the 1928 Herschell-Spillman carousel overlooking Lake Ontario to the tune playing on either our 1926 Model 105 or 1931 Model 145 Wurlitzer band organs. For children 52 inches or less in height, there are five vintage kiddie rides. Adults and children 8 years and older can try their luck at one of the 25¢ vintage Skeeball machines. The park features a small old-fashioned arcade and a "Pick-Up-A-Duck Game" (a prize every time). The WNY Dairy Farmers sponsor a free Magic Show featuring Rob and Carol Allen, during days of operation at 2 pm on the Tom Kelley Rustic Theater stage. In addition, there is a private nursing mothers' area. All rides are just 25¢ and shoes are required while in the park.

As a first-year superintendent, these last few months have certainly posed some challenges. I do need to express my appreciation for Highway Superintendent Jon Miller and the Highway Department as a whole. Jon and I were in regular contact, either during late hours of the evening or early hours of the morning. Throughout the winter, he always gave me the current status of travel within the Town to assist me in making the decision if the current weather patterns would impede our students getting to school. As the spring is upon us, we are developing our 2025-2026 school budget. Our budget development timeline is as follows:

Our Board of Education meetings begin at 7:00PM in the Newfane Early Childhood Center in room 129. We encourage anyone interested to attend.

As far as facilities are concerned, we are currently developing our next capital project which we intend on putting up for vote in December of 2025. We need to address some major infrastructure issues, particularly our HVAC systems as well as updating our Middle School classrooms. We are also working to determine if there are immediate solutions to address some of the heating issues, we experienced at the elementary school this past cold season.

In addition, our District Planning Team is working to develop a culture and climate survey that will be administered this spring to our students, staff, families and community. This information, as well as our academic information, will be packaged together for a State of the District presentation in the Fall of 2025.

Once again, I want to express my vast enthusiasm to be part of the Newfane School Community. I am so impressed by the kindness, compassion and respect that our students show each and every day. These positive characteristics are the result of values that our families are instilling in our children. Our faculty and staff are dedicated and demonstrate pride in our school district. And the community support for our schools is overwhelming. I hope that each and every one of you have a wonderful spring season.







Temperance Was an Influential Movement in Newfane

-- Kept Newfane mostly 'Dry' for 100 years --

Despite tales of hard-scrabble drinking by early woodsman and the stories of freewheeling summer resort life in Olcott, the temperance or no-alcohol movement held a firm and dominating grip on the Newfane community for a century. Reports of temperance activities in Newfane emerge in writings from the 1830s and the forces arguing both sides, to keep Newfane a 'dry town' or permit alcohol sales, were well-organized and unrelenting in their activism. Hotel operators fought for years to gain approval to sell alcohol on their premises in Olcott, but Newfane's temperance advocates kept most of Newfane dry until the end of national prohibition in 1933.

Temperance or abstinence from alcohol was a deeply held moral principle among Newfane's early farm-centered families and was a tenet of the religious community. Traveling temperance preachers were welcome visitors at Sunday services throughout the town proclaiming the scourge of booze and all its sorrow. Temperance held a powerful influence on American politics and society through the early 1900s, when nationally organized groups like the Women's Christian Temperance Union (WCTU), Anti-Saloon League and Good Templers pressured state and local governments to regulate alcohol sales. A chapter of the WCTU thrived in Newfane for decades and early temperance gatherings were held at what is now the Outing Park cottage community off East Lake Road. By the 1870s, temperance proponents were successful in establishing a local law making all of Newfane a 'dry town'. Efforts to outlaw alcohol sales were also successful in other rural areas like Somerset, but alcohol remained legal or only faced limited restrictions in cities and communities with broader economic and social profiles.

An excise tax or a state or national tax on the sale of specific products was generally applied to the sale of alcohol from the founding days of our nation. The tax was specifically applied to alcohol because

it was a good revenue source applied to a discretionary product. NYS managed how excise taxes could be levied and collected, and in 1840 it gave local governments the authority to grant excise licenses, or liquor licenses, thereby regulating the sale of alcohol in the community. The law required that a public vote be held every two years and local leaders would use this authority to keep Newfane dry over several decades. These laws also established a battle-ground that temperance crusaders could use to promote sobriety. By 1896 the state required that these biannual elections include four local propositions on the ballot; 1) to allow licenses solely for on-premise consumption, 2) allow licensing for sales that can only be consumed off-premises, 3) the sale of items containing liquor can only be approved for drugstores and physicians, 4) authorizing licenses for hotel keepers. In each of these biannual elections in Newfane, the vote was always overwhelming that the town would remain dry and none of these options were approved. For thirteen consecutive elections over 26 years, temperance advocates maintained their command of alcohol policy in Newfane. 493 Newfane citizens voted on the four propositions in 1902, the votes for on and off site consumption and that by pharmacists and physicians were defeated by two-thirds majorities, the vote to license

Amid the temperance success of these years, however, there is a back story and nobody doubted that alcohol was in common use, even in Newfane. The dry laws targeted the sale of alcohol in public places, but Newfane had bountiful fruits and grains that made alcohol production at home and on the farm an easy and widespread practice. Throughout

Newfane's dry-law years alcohol sales in the hotels and taverns of Olcott were a consistent problem for local authorities. Enforcement of dry laws for a rural community like Newfane was a challenge, since there was no state or sheriff patrol in those days, so the town could only present charges to the local Justice for a possible fine or county jail time. In 1886, eight indictments were brought against hotel keepers in Olcott for selling without a license and the record shows only three were fined \$10 to \$40 each. In the privacy of the ballot box, the community strongly endorsed Newfane being a dry-town and in particular opposed alcohol sales in saloons and bars, but there was little enthusiasm for 'throwing the book at' or severely penalizing local citizens. There were instances when local citizens applied their own form of enforcement, like in 1906 when two individuals thought they would test the community's teetotaling resolve and open an illegal saloon in Newfane. They were promptly shut-down and driven-out by a band of citizens, and afterwards the illegal operator claimed the righteous town folk did \$5,000 in damage. Meanwhile in Olcott, the nation's most prominent temperance activist, Carrie Nation, made a stop in 1901 and 'busted-up' the Week's Hotel on Main Street near Franklin. Writings by old-timers note that when the Methodist Church, then located on the west side of the creek, was considering locations to erect a new church in 1909, they selected the current site on Main Street in an effort to curb the drinking and depraved ways of the village.

As Newfane prepared for the biannual vote of 1886 to continue 'dry-town' restrictions, the hotel and innkeepers of Olcott were becoming more vocal in their efforts to gain approval of alcohol sales at their establishments. Their appeals were countered by the Newfane Temperance Association who claimed the businesses had been "openly violating the law for ten years, thereby debasing and demoralizing manhood, wronging womanhood and defrauding childhood." By 1902, the International Railway Company (IRC) had completed the trolley from Lockport and built the Olcott Beach Hotel, bringing a far more influential voice to the argument for issuing licenses in Olcott. Even with IRC lobbying, the 1902 vote to authorize liquor sales in Olcott was defeated, prompting the hotel operators to change strategy and look to the courts and leading politicians for support. Using the argument that not all citizens were properly notified about the previous vote, the IRC was successful in

obtaining a court order that a 'special election' be held to resubmit the liquor question to the voters. Campaigns were immediately launched on both sides to align support, the IRC offered free trolley rides to the polling station and the children of those opposing liquor sales were seen wearing badges saying "Vote against saloons and liquor for my sake."



At the special election on June 11, 1903, there was a 223 vote majority to authorize 'limited licensing' of liquor sales, but only in Olcott hotels, not taverns or stores. Outside the hotels and in the remainder of the town, Newfane's status as a 'dry town' was reinforced. Forces for and against licensing would continue to clash for another seventeen years until national prohibition was passed in 1920, which brought its own methods of federal enforcement. Rum-running and the illegal transit and sale of alcohol from Canada became a hugely profitable business in Newfane and Olcott during prohibition - not to supply alcohol locally - but Newfane became a principal link in the supply chain to fill the unquenchable demand for booze in Buffalo and other WNY cities. The failure and widely unpopular experience with prohibition and its repeal in 1933 brought an end to Newfane's time as a dry town.

Displaying Flags: The national flag code has been changed to allow the horizontal display of the American flag during patriotic events if it is done in a respectful manner. We were previously unable to carry the flag horizontally like at the beginning of sporting events, but the Department of Defense has changed this policy, so you are likely to see our armed services back on the field during game honors helping to hold the large flags.

Changes to the Veterans Legacy Memorial Program (VLM) The stories and tributes of eligible veterans can now be shared before they pass away, instead of leaving it to their family to submit after their death. "Your Story, Your Legacy" is a feature of the Veterans Legacy Memorial Program (VLM) that honors nearly 10 million veterans in national and private cemeteries. "Your Story, Your Legacy" allows eligible veterans to submit images, autobiographies and historical documents through a secure site, providing a way for veterans to document their stories while still living, ensuring that family members, friends, and others will hear and appreciate the experiences of your service. After the veteran passes away their story and legacy can go "live" at www.vlm.cem.va.gov and be visible to those who visit their page. Get started by going to the VA website to file your pre-need eligibility determination - you can receive help from the Niagara County Veteran Service Office or the Post. VLM is also available to Veterans in private cemeteries who received a VA provided headstone, marker, cover or medallion ordered back to 1996. Families can ask about adding a VLM tribute.



Newfane Post 873's Auxiliary wins National Award: The Post's Auxiliary received the award for *Most Outstanding Unit Junior Activities Program* in the American Legion's Eastern Division, which covers eleven states, Puerto Rico and D.C. The recognition from the American Legion National Auxiliary President was presented to Niagara County Auxiliary President and Newfane Post 873 Auxiliary member Cherie Stern by New York Auxiliary President Kimberly Quick during her visit to Niagara.

Honoring American Legion Post 873 Charter Members: American Legion flags will be placed on the graves of World War 1 veterans who first organized our Newfane Legion post in 1925. Honoring our celebrated World War 1 veterans recognizes their work to form the Newfane Post 100 years ago.

Cemetery Flags: Each Memorial Day, the Legion places American flags on all veteran's graves in Newfane and all of WNY, including Niagara Falls, Kenmore, Barker and Gasport. Flags will be placed in the days leading up to the Memorial celebration. Memorial Day Remembrance Ceremony: This year's ceremony is set for Monday May 26th at 11 AM at Corwin Cemetery. The program will feature a centennial recognition of World War 1 veterans who obtained the charter and established the Newfane Legion 100 years ago. Come prepared for the weather with a chair and water. If severe weather threatens the alternate site is the Community Center.


Eastern Niagara Veterans Monument: Work is nearly complete on the monument located in Hartland. The dedication ceremony has been set for Flag Day, June 14th at 9 AM. The memorial site is next to the Hartland Volunteer FIre Company on Ridge Road.

Attention Female Veterans of WWII, Korea and Vietnam: Buffalo Niagara Honor Flight is coordinating an All-Female flight mission for October 2025 (tentatively 11th-12th). They are looking for 40 women veterans from WWII, Korea and Vietnam and their female guardians. Information and the application are on buffaloniagarahonorflight.org under the "All Female Flight" tab at the top of the page. Their goal is that the mission will be supported and funded primarily by women, whether they be business owners, executives, female-led organizations or individual women donors along with veteran organizations. Sponsorship and underwriting can be found under the same online tab.

250 Years of Service: Three of our Armed Services turn 250 years old this year. They Army was formed on June 14th, 1775, the Navy on October 13, 1775 and the Marines Corps on November 10th, 1775. The Navy was disbanded in 1789 after the Revolutionary War due to lack of funds and was reinstituted in 1794. This is why the Navy flag comes third in order after the Marine Corps flag in a flag display.

Replace Your Worn American Flag: Is your flag tattered or worn from storms and wind? The Post carries a stock of American made flags in various sizes and materials you can purchase. They are embroidered with stars, sewn stripes and made to government (GSA) standards. We can usually beat store prices and a portion of the purchase helps fund the Post's activities supporting veterans and their family members. Call us at (716) 408-3311 to purchase one.

Post Meetings: Our meetings are held in the Community Center behind the Town Hall at 7:00 pm (6 pm in December and June) on the second Monday of every month. We always welcome new veteran members. With the 2019 LEGION Act (Let Everyone Get Involved in Opportunities for National Service Act), the eligibility for American Legion membership now spans from December 7, 1941, until a time when the U.S. is no longer at war, as determined by Congress. If you are a veteran and would like to be part of an organization that had a hand in the formation of the Veteran's Bureau, the forerunner to the Veteran's Administration, the Flag Code, the National Archives and the G.I. Bill, stop by a meeting or give us a call. As Legion members we lobby for the welfare of veterans and service members, support our veteran families and help with activities in the Newfane community.



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
