Update from the Supervisor's Office

Projects and Improvements

The arrival of spring marks another busy time for the Town of Newfane. Our efforts have centered on completing the West Beach Berm, a final stage in building flood protection and shoreline stability for Olcott's west side. In the weeks ahead, we will pave the parking lot, add benches and other features – and build a pedestrian "walkover" deck for access to the water. Our Highway Department has also taken advantage of the mild winter days to make improvements to the parking lot on Olcott's east side across from the Lakeview Village Shoppes. More paving work on the lot is planned and other upgrades will be made to the docks and office building at the Town Marina.

Improvements to our Wastewater Treatment plant have begun and the anticipated completion date is October 31, 2025. This \$8-9 million project encompasses a near total overhaul of the 50+ year old facility. The Town continues to aggressively pursue grants to help offset the cost to ratepayers.

The Town was initially awarded a \$1 million grant to fund the project and has since received another \$1.8 million in funding. I have again appealed to our federal representatives -- Congresswoman Claudia Tenney and Senators Schumer and Gillibrand—for another \$3 million. I am also looking to secure a zero-interest loan to cover any gap between grant funding and final costs.

I have secured 90-WEST, the area's premier country band to headline the celebration from 7pm - 10pm. And throughout the Bicentennial season, everyone in town can join the celebration by decorating your front yards, porches and homes with red, white and blue patriotic flags, bunting and flowers (see page x for more). Of special note, the Recovery Center of Niagara is donating \$10,000 and sponsoring our July 3rd fireworks spectacular!






Display Your Newfane Bicentennial Pride ... Showcase your home or business this season with Red, White and Blue

Niagara County Legislature 14th District Legislator Shawn Foti

Happy Spring to Newfane and the entire 14th District. It has been a wild winter and as a year-round outdoor enthusiast, I am one of those people who wished for more of a traditional winter, with good snow for skiing and sledding. Being a public official, mild winters are better for budgets and help limit road damage caused by salting/plowing, so it is a mixed reaction but here we are entering spring again.

2024 is shaping up to be another extremely busy year for myself, Town of Newfane, and all of Niagara County. At the time of writing this newsletter, we are weeks away from kicking off the Newfane Bicentennial with a fabulous dinner and reception. I want to thank the entire 2024 Bicentennial Committee for their continuous hard work and planning. I can not wait to celebrate all year long at the many events planned and numerous organizations assisting with hosting these events. Another upcoming event that may have passed by the time you read this is the 2024 Totality Solar Eclipse. Countless hours of planning have gone on behind the scenes involving emergency services, tourism, parks, public safety, transportation, etc, to make this a successful and safe event for our residents and the hundreds of thousands of tourists who will visit our county. I hope the weather cooperates and everyone has a chance to view the eclipse and enjoy this once in a lifetime opportunity.

Olcott Beach Water Quality

When contemplating running for office, if you told me that I would somehow find myself studying bird poop in the waters of Olcott Beach, I would have said you are crazy. But here we are! Last year, we saw an increase in frequency of bacteria levels that closed our beach and created a public health problem. I heard from many concerned residents, businesses, tourism board, and the Town of Newfane. Working with Supervisor Syracuse, NYS DEC, and the County Health Department, I requested increased water sampling and also to have the water samples sent out for a new DNA study to find the source of the bacteria E.coli. A previous DNA study done over 10 years ago pointed to ruminant species which could be deer or cows. The new study came back with high levels of avian feces, bird poop. Now we have a path to focus on and can begin to collect more data. Our goal is to find a solution which will provide safe and clean publicly accessible water, within the guidelines of the many different governmental jurisdictions. I want to thank the community for your patience and also our partners at NYS for stepping up and providing resources and funding to find a solution. We have a great team working on this.

Agriculture Rights Advisory Panel

Agriculture is Niagara County's largest market sector and it is our way of life. We need to rally behind our local farmers, and support them with both respect and also financially by buying local. That is why I am proud to have been a cosponsor of the resolution to create an Agriculture Rights Advisory Panel. The concept is similar to our Gun Owners' Right Advisory Panel we started a couple of years ago. We look at the Agricultural industry, quite frankly as under attack by downstate legislators who do not know anything about farm economics. With that in mind, the Legislature felt compelled to step in to try to support farmers and our agricultural industry. What we plan to do is appoint members from the local agriculture community to see what we can do within the powers of county government to support farming, perhaps through some local law or targeted investment. Niagara County has a long, proud tradition as an agricultural community that strongly supports the rights of farmers to run their operations free from harassment and with the support of local government. I look forward to seeing the advocacy and recommendations that come from this distinguished panel.



Hometown Hero Banners a Popular Addition to Newfane's Streetscape

Thanks to all those participating in Newfane's Hometown Heroes streetside banner project and for your support in honoring Newfane's past and current military service members. The Newfane Hometown Heroes program placed 120 banners throughout the town in 2023 and more will go up this year. The application period for this year has passed and our volunteers and the Town Highway Department will be working through May to install the banners for this season. New York is in need of a rescue plan.

Crime is up, economic activity is down, and our state continues to lead the nation in population loss. Individual rights and constitutional freedoms are under attack. These are just a few consequences of a state government controlled entirely by one party.

For years, we've witnessed a drastic decline in public safety, a depleted workforce, rising taxes, business-crippling regulations, and a lackluster economic "recovery" from the COVID-19 pandemic. A legislature dominated by New York City progressives has sent our state down the wrong path.

We need to make our state stronger by expanding economic opportunity and strengthening our workforce. This includes investing in infrastructure for the 21st century, helping our veterans and military families thrive, and ensuring every child receives a quality education.

We must make our state more affordable, by slashing burdensome taxes and regaining control of our governments enormous spending. By reducing the cost of living, and improving the state's business climate, we will be giving families the ability to stay in New York instead of fleeing. Policies like the banning of natural gas is just the latest example of how our state is heading in the wrong direction.

Finally, we must make our state more free. This means finally ending all Covid mandates, and rehiring thousands of workers fired over personal health choices and protecting parental rights when it comes to their children's education.

These are the issues that matter most to people and exactly what the Legislature should focus on this session. The time for talk and rhetoric is over — New Yorkers deserve real solutions to real problems. We are ready to tackle these issues and deliver for our constituents. To succeed, we need a unified partnership - meaning Republicans, Democrats, the Governor, and the Legislature working together – to Rescue New York in 2023.



NORRIS WORKING FOR BACK-TO-BASICS BUDGET

A Legislative Column from Assemblyman Mike Norris (R,C-Lockport)

As all households and businesses know, budgets are about priorities. This state budget must also be so – yet the message we are hearing from our downstate driven leaders at the state Capitol does not align with our priorities. So far, the budget proposed by the governor has prioritized illegal aliens over our local schools. It's pushed special interests yet again over the hardworking citizen.

That's not my priority. As your representative, I've been working for a back-to-basics approach to budgeting in Albany. I've called on the governor and our leaders to follow this back-to-basics approach based on the principle that government must control spending, realize it cannot be all things to all people and where we can make investments we must do so with smart, strategic goals that benefit everyone for the long term.

That means prioritizing key investments such as local infrastructure that create jobs, ensure public safety and support our economy. Having safe roads, bridges, sewers and culverts is essential, yet after many years of receiving no additional funding under Gov. Andrew Cuomo, our local infrastructure program – known as the Consolidated Local Street and Highway Improvement Program (CHIPS), my colleagues and I rallied with our partners in highway departments and succeeded in delivering a historic \$100 million increase for CHIPS in 2021-22 and \$60 million more in 2023-

While this funding increase was well needed, well deserved and much appreciated in our local communities, when you are talking about a state budget that spends hundreds of billions of dollars annually, this funding is

simply a drop in the bucket and wasn't enough, especially when you consider the extreme flooding along Lake Ontario's southern shore, years of difficult winters and the crushing burden of inflation.

This is why we are disappointed and surprised that Gov. Kathy Hochul has proposed to eliminate \$60 million from CHIPS and reducing foundation aid to rural school districts like Newfane Central Schools while at the same time handing out billions in taxpayer dollars to illegal aliens for hotel rooms, cell phones, and debit cards.

I don't accept that. My colleagues and I are asking for a full restoration of school and CHIPS funding as well as an additional \$200 million infrastructure investment in this budget to position our communities with the resources they need to maintain our infrastructure, help us sustain and grow our economy and ensure public safety for years to come. That's the right priority for Western New York taxpayers.

An Update from Niagara County Sheriff Michael J. Filicetti



I hope this letter finds you well, and I trust you are ready for another wonderful spring. I would like to highlight a new program at the Sheriff's Office, and a new local law established in Niagara County. Last year, the Niagara County Legislature passed local law 2023-3, entitled: "Operation of Off-Road Vehicles on Public Highways in Niagara County". This law was created due to the increased number of dangerous incidents involving dirt bikes, ATV's, dune buggies, UTV's, go-carts, golf carts and the like on roadways throughout our community. In short, the law prohibits the use of these vehicles on any public roadway throughout the County, with penalties

that include impoundment of the vehicle by law enforcement and a \$250 fee for the first offense, and \$1,000 for any future offenses for a previously seized vehicle. These fines are in addition to the towing fee of the vehicle itself. This law is applicable to all within the county, including those who equip their vehicle with a slow-moving vehicle emblem in hopes of avoiding law enforcement contact.

Please use this information to make informed decisions in the future if you own and operate an off-road vehicle. This law was put in place to address flagrant violators that are causing issues on our roadways. Several instances of enforcement were conducted in the past year within Newfane, and we will continue to enforce this law with our partner agencies to better protect off-road operators, motorists, and pedestrians.

To better serve our community, the Niagara County Sheriff's Office is taking extra steps to help First Responders identify residents who may have difficulty communicating or understanding directions during an emergency. The Disabilities Response Decals Program is ideal for households with a member who is blind or deaf, has autism, Down Syndrome, Alzheimer's Disease, mental disabilities, or other communication disorders. Our Disabilities Response Decals may be displayed on your residence or vehicle to alert First Responders upon arrival. The Disabilities Response Decals are available at local Fire Departments, Town Halls, Police Agencies, or contact NCSO Community Services Division at (716)438-3310. To have an alert added to you or your loved one's home, or person, due to one of these parameters, please reach out to our Communications Division at (716) 438-3393 and submit the request. This information is not shared with anyone except First Responders in an emergency or other qualifying circumstance.

Thank you for reading this message, and spreading the word throughout the community. Our hope is for voluntary compliance for a higher quality of life and increased security for all. Enjoy the season, take care, and as always – stay safe.

THE FIRST BAPTIST CHURCH FOOD PANTRY

The First Baptist Church Pantry is located at 6047 East Ave in Newfane. You can't miss it, because it is a cobblestone church with big double red doors. It serves the community in two ways. First its doors welcome everyone who wishes to seek inspirational guidance under the ministry of Pastor Kim Smith. Second, it houses a food pantry under the management of Linda Peace.

Originally the Food Pantry was located in Olcott and had served the Migrant Ministries. It was than relocated to The First Baptist Church in Newfane, where today it not only takes care of the migrants and their families, who come to work on the local farms, but has expanded to assisting the families in the community that are in need of food.

Through the New York State grants and USDA donations, Mrs. Peace is able to purchase healthy foods as well as basic staples at a low rate through the WNY food Bank. The pantry also receives left over fresh produce and eggs from the local farmers. Fresh Breads and desserts are picked up weekly from the local store. Local organizations do food drives and donate monetary gifts. Cooking With the Clerk's

Chicken Yum Yums

4 Servings Total cook time: 1 hour

3- Chicken Breasts

8 ounces shredded cheese (4 cheese variety package)

3- 10 oz. cans of Green Chili Sauce

2 cups instant white rice

Tostitos scoops

August 1st of each year, we remove all unpaid balances to the following year's County tax bill. A tax removal fee of %10 is added to your bill as well as a \$100.00 administrative fee.

Garbage Reminders

Please have your garbage and/or recycling out curbside by 6 a.m. on your garbage day to ensure they pick it up. Please place your garbage and recycling totes with the handles facing towards the house and keep them a minimum of 2 feet away from mailboxes or other totes, which will give room for the arms of the truck to properly pick up your tote to empty it.

Large item pick-up is the third full week of collection each month on your garbage day. Please adhere to three large items on your garbage day during bulk pick-up week.

Should you require another garbage tote, please contact the Water Department at 716-778-8132 Ext. 6 to purchase and one will be delivered. We have large garbage totes available for \$80.00 and small totes available for \$50.00. Please be advised an additional annual fee of \$55 applies to any additional tote. Bag tags are available for \$5.00 a piece at the Water Office at the Newfane Town Hall. A maximum of 5 bag tags are allowed per week.

Water Service Material and Size Inspection Reminder

The Town of Newfane Water Office is required by New York state to perform and record inspections on all homes in the Town of Newfane for the water service line material and size from the public side, as well as the homeowner's side. These inspections are to ensure that there are no lead water service lines in the Town of Newfane and are to be completed by October of 2024. Please be advised that the Newfane Water Office will be calling residents to schedule the inspection or to let them know when the inspections will be taking place on their street and to make sure they will be home. BUILDING INSPECTOR'S OFFICE

Spring is here and there are a few items to note from your Building Inspector, David Schmidt.

First, as of December 30, 2020, yearly fire safety and property maintenance inspections entitled "2020 Fire Code of New York State and 2020 Property Maintenance Code of New York State" must be performed by a town's code enforcement officer, which for Newfane, is also the building inspector.

Properties that fall under this code are those which contain an assembly area, all multiple dwellings, and all nonresidential occupancies, such as: all commercial and multiple residential buildings with more than 3 apartments, all small businesses, all warehouses, all nursing home buildings and the like, all fire departments, churches, taverns, restaurants, gas stations, hotels, day cares with 5 or more children and outdoor events with over 1000 people. Those that are exempt are small in-home businesses such as in-home hairdressers, tax preparer etc.

Businesses that are required to have this yearly inspection done will be receiving a call from the Building Inspector to set up an appointment, or you can call to set up a time that is most convenient for you. Any questions, please call the building inspectors office at 716-954-2030 (talk or text).

With Spring comes Spring clean-up. Many limbs and branches have come down with the winds we have experienced. Please refer to the Highway Department's article in this newsletter to see what options you have for tree debris. As a reminder there is a NYS Burn Ban, which is in effect from March 16-May 14. For more information on this, visit NYS DEC web site.

Finally, if you have an outstanding Building Permit, please note that the Newfane Building Inspector is to be called for all inspections done for your project. There are many outstanding permits which should be closed but the inspector has not been called to do the final inspection. All of these are done for the safety and well-being of your home or business, so please call to set up an appointment for your final inspection.

As your new Town Building Inspector/Code Enforcement Officer, I have appreciated the support and well wishes from our community. Spring is a time for many new projects to begin in our town and I will do my best to get to each of them in a timely manner. 

A FEW TIPS TO KEEP IN MIND IF YOU'RE A DOG OWNER:

- 1) Make sure your dog(s) are always licensed and wear their ID tag. If your dog becomes lost and picked up by a DCO we can quickly identify and reunite you with your dog.
- 2) Always have your dog leashed and, in your control. This will prevent your dog from running off or after something that seems fun to play with.
- 3) If while out for a walk and your dog needs to defecate, please be a good neighbor and pick up after your dog. Not only is it neighborly but it is also a town law.
- 4) If you have a complaint or a question and get our voicemail, please keep in mind we do have other jobs/family and it may take some time for us to get back to you. But we will get back to you.
- 5) If licensing a dog(s) for the first time you will need to provide a certificate of current rabies vaccination as well as a certificate for spayed/neutered if applicable. Renewals are annually effective the month the dog was originally licensed, current rabies vaccination information must be on file with the Clerk's office and a spay/neuter certificate must be filed at the time of renewal to take advantage of the lower license fee. The Niagara County Department of Health has 4 free rabies clinics scheduled for the remainder of the year. To get the dates and locations, you can visit their website.

Tree removal companies are responsible to remove ALL of their own debris. *****

We will NOT pick up large STUMPS.

We will not pick up leaves or yard rubbish, etc.

A maximum amount of 2 tandem truck loads will be picked up at a time at any one residence.

We will NOT pick up branches in front of wooded lots that are being cleared.

We will NOT be responsible for any damages to anything that is under the pile of brush that we cannot see. Large piles are picked up with large machinery.

Summer is just around the corner and you know what that means! It's almost time to pack up the kids and head to Olcott. The Olcott Beach Carousel Park (OBCP) is opening May 25, 2024 from 12 - 6 pm. Come celebrate our 22nd season! OBCP is a vintage kiddie amusement park run by volunteers. Adults and children can take a spin on the 1928 Herschell-Spillman carousel overlooking Lake Ontario to the tune playing on either our 1926 Model 105 or 1931 Model 145 Wurlitzer band organs. For children 52 inches or less in height, there are five vintage kiddie rides. Adults and children 8 years and older can try their luck at one of the 25¢ vintage Skeeball machines. The park features a small old-fashioned arcade and a "Pick up a Duck Game" (a prize every time). The WNY Dairy Farmers sponsor a free Magic Show featuring Rob and Carol Allen, during days of operation at 2 pm on the Tom Kelley Rustic Theater stage. In addition, there is a private nursing mothers' area. All rides are just 25¢ and shoes are required while in the park.

We are always in need of volunteers; they are the heartbeat of the park that keeps it operating. Anyone interested in becoming a volunteer, can Email Rosemary at rsansone1947@ gmail.com or call 716-778-7066. Two three hour shifts (12 - 3 & 3 -6 pm) are available each day the park is open. Volunteers can choose which days, shifts and which areas they would like to work (ticket booth, carousel operator, Skeeball, or Pick Up A Duck game). We train our volunteers on Saturday, May 18th, from 10 am-12 pm, so if you haven't had a chance to sign-up, just show up! However, if someone wants to volunteer and can't come that day, we can make special arrangements to train them when they come to volunteer. There is a sign-up sheet in the carousel building for available shifts and jobs. Volunteers can sign up during our hours of operation.

If you are available, we are always looking for volunteers to help get the park set up for the season. We will need help on May 11, starting at 9 a.m. Generally this involves cleaning, some painting, and moving equipment from storage.

In addition to our volunteers, the park also employs high school and college students aged 16 or older to run the kiddie rides (Ferris wheel, rocket swings, boats, cars, and sky fighter). Training is also provided and they are paid \$17.00 per hour.





Olcott's Dancehall and Big-Band Era

Much has been written about the dancehalls, big bands and nationally recognized celebrities who performed in Olcott Beach in the first half of the 1900s. Writings and personal recollections abound that highlight this popular and prosperous time in Newfane's history, but as stories are shared through the decades, the details and facts about the entertainers and venues are not always accurately retold. A closer look tells more about which big-name performers actually appeared in Olcott and where they played.

Most of the big band appearances are associated with the Olcott Beach Hotel, but many nationally known celebrities also performed at Riccio's Dance Hall, and there were other Olcott venues operating in this period when dancehalls were a popular attraction. The Olcott Beach Hotel operated from 1901 to 1937, drawing thousands of leisure visitors each season who were seeking summer fun and entertainment. The grand one-hundred room hotel had a large ballroom and stage they called the 'Olcott Beach Casino' – they used an older definition of 'casino' meaning a large hall or building for music, dancing and entertainment. The hotel did not offer gambling, which was illegal, even though related stories tell that gambling was common in the backrooms.

Even before celebrity bandleaders made regular appearances in Olcott Beach, dancehalls were already a popular attraction. As early as 1884, the Newfane Coronet Band played at the dance pavilion in the Lakeshore House, the old James Cooper home in today's Krull Park that became a hotel and was demolished when the Olcott Beach Hotel was built. At the Luna Park amusement area where the skating rink and Ermas would later be, they converted the silent movie theater to the 'Dreamland' dancehall that was destroyed in the 1927 block fire.

Gabrielle Riccio came to Olcott from Buffalo in 1928 and purchased much of the property bounded by Main and Cooper Streets that had burned in the 1927 fire. Riccio demolished the Albright Hotel that stood on the northwest corner of Main and Lockport Streets and built a dancehall that would host many big-name acts. Another of Olcott's early dancehalls was located where today's village commons is next to the Carousel Park. Started by Jacob Ulrich, it later became the Olcotta Danceland Pavilion operated by Lawrence (Loren) Schnurstein ... and when Burt Flynn took over the former Boeckmann Restaurant that is now Mariner's Landing, he briefly promoted dancing, but then decided to make it a bingo hall.

Concerts, dancing and vaudeville acts were common in the early years of the Olcott Beach Hotel. Much of the music was provided by popular regimental bands affiliated with the military, such as the 65th and 74th Regiment Bands that regularly played summer concerts in Buffalo area parks. Victor Herbert and his famous Pittsburgh Orchestra played the season opening concert at the hotel in 1902 and received a full five-minute standing ovation, after which he regaled the audience with the Coronation March and Blue Danube. Big band appearances dominated the Olcott entertainment scene after the repeal of prohibition in the early 1930s. Donnell Charles (1912-1996), a Lockport musician and orchestra leader wrote in 1982 about his experiences playing with bands that performed in Olcott. He notes that some of the famous 'big bands' to appear at the Olcott Beach Hotel were Paul Whitman, Guy Lombardo, Tommy Dorsey, Jimmy Dorsey, Louis Armstrong, Charlie Barnet, Red Nichols, Mal Hallett and Artie Shaw. Other reports note that Billie Holiday sang in Olcott with Artie Shaw before she gained national fame and that Benny Goodman and Mitchell Rappaport also performed at the hotel.

The agent connected with Riccio's Dance Pavilion was Ray Kneeland, a prominent music and concert promoter from Lockport who booked popular national celebrities at Buffalo's Town Cassino, Crystal Beach and

the Celeron in Chautauqua. The big bands would often play the Buffalo area ballrooms on weekends and then come to Olcott for Monday and Wednesday performances. After the Olcott Beach Hotel was demolished in 1937, Riccio's took on the name 'Olcott Beach Casino'. Cab Calloway and Harry James played at Riccio's, as did Artie Shaw and Louis Armstrong. Many Lockport area musicians also appeared on the Olcott Beach stages; including the Stuart Dussault Band, Tony Barone and the Serenaders, Kittle's Band, the North End Band and bands led by Lockport's Bill Suthers.

The big band era ended with the outbreak of World War II. Gabrielle Riccio had meanwhile built the bowling alley that was first operated by his daughter Betty March and later became Erma's, and he rebuilt the skating rink operated by his daughter Marie and husband Lavern Maclam. He then demolished the dancehall and the remaining portion became Riccio's Tavern - later named Cal's and operated by a third daughter Sylvia and husband Cal Kruger (this became the Lighthouse Grille and Captain's Galley). The Ulrich dancehall, later operated by Schnurstein's, was purchased by Joseph and Tillie Tryznadel and called The Olcotta. Joe and Tillie's daughter, Jackie Gerling operated the Olcotta and other Main Street businesses in succeeding years and in 1960 her husband John built the Olcott Bell's IGA store next to the Olcotta, which was first operated by Joe and Tillie and was later Ive's Foods. Walter Holtz had operated a shooting gallery where the Bell's IGA was built, then he and Edna purchased the old Bradley Restaurant next door and opened the Seafood Bar. Joe Tryznadel's sister, Jesse Fisher and her husband Ed operated the nearby Coney Island Restaurant and Erma's with their children Erma Nowak and David. Burt Flynn expanded to open the Olcott Beach Amusement Park and other amusements, he changed the name of Boeckmann's to the Park Edge and when it burned he rebuilt it as the Village Tavern. Flynn's properties were later owned by Pete and Jim Januze, who named the park Lakeland Amusements – today these sites are occupied by the Carousel Park, Mariner's Landing and Park Place Restaurant.

The Post's activities around town: Since the last town newsletter, Post members and town residents helped collect over 570 pounds of peanut butter and jelly for food pantries through the Peanut Butter and Jelly Drive and raised more than \$566 for the Salvation Army's Red Kettle campaign during our collections at Newfane's Tops Market. Post members served as the color guard for the Light-Up Newfane parade and participated with a float and handed out candy canes to people along the route. Members participated in the Wreaths Across America program by laying wreaths at the Western New York National Cemetery in Corfu. VA Cemeteries: Veterans, are you thinking of making the Western New York National Cemetery or another VA cemetery your final resting place? You can ask for a pre-need determination of eligibility to make burial planning easier for your family in this difficult time. The application can be made on-line using the VA.gov website and by mail or fax. For veterans who are determined eligible, the burial includes opening and closing of the grave, a grave liner, ongoing care of the gravesite, a government-furnished headstone or marker, burial flag and Presidential Memorial Certificate. These benefits come at no cost to the veteran or the family. If qualified, you will receive a letter and information from the VA confirming your eligibility for burial in a VA cemetery. Keep the information in a safe place and discuss your burial plan and VA benefits with your family. You can always decide to opt out of the program if your plans change. Please contact the Post or the Niagara County Veterans Service Office if you have questions or need assistance.

Where's your DD Form 214? Veterans and family members need to know where you keep important veteran's service records. The DD Form 214 serves many purposes and opens the doors for many veterans benefits. The Niagara County Clerk's office will scan your DD Form 214 into their system for safe keeping and can give you a certified copy if needed. The Post has experienced instances where a family could not locate a veteran's service record when arranging Military Honors for a funeral. Having your form stored at the County Clerk's office makes it easily accessible and also provides a backup if your copy at home is lost, damaged or cannot be found. While you are there, sign up for your Thank-A-Vet card and start getting some discounts at participating businesses.





Old Olcott Days – Pioneer Picnic Bicentennial Celebration 1824 - 2024

Known as the Pine Grove in the 1800s, today's Krull Park hosted the annual picnics of Niagara County's pioneer settlers, their families and descendants for 70 years. Within the first 10 years of the popular social and high-profile political gatherings founded in 1877, attendance at the summer outings grew to 10,000 people. In 1888, pioneer leaders dedicated "Ye Olde Log Cabin" in the grove to preserve their historical artifacts and heritage. Theodore Roosevelt spoke at the Pioneer Association Picnic in 1899 when he was Governor of New York.

This year's Old Olcott Days and Bicentennial celebration recognizes the treasured legacy that our pioneer forebearers left for the future of Niagara County. There will be a Pioneer Picnic on Saturday, July 27th at noon featuring a professional Teddy Roosevelt reenactor, free hot dogs & water (while they last), and games with prizes for the kids. There will also be checkers, chess, cards, tic tac toe, corn hole, and ladder ball for the adults! Ye Olde Log Cabin Museum will be open all weekend and will have additional historic displays. There will be wine tasting from Schulze Winery and nostalgic concessions available from The Nut Hut, like cotton candy and candied nuts! The Town Trolley will operate from 1pm-5pm on Saturday and Sunday providing free narrated historical tours of Olcott Beach.

The historic weekend will also feature the **National Band Organ Rally**, a nostalgic assembly of band organs that appeals to everyone's childhood memories of amusement parks and vintage movies. Come and join in the spirit of their festive and recognizable tunes!
